First 5 El Dorado: "Parents are a child's first teacher"

The first years of life are critical for a child's learning and development. Children raised in healthy, strong families are better prepared for school.

First 5 El Dorado Commission invests \$1 million annually to build an early childhood system to assist families in preparing their children for school.

What is School Readiness?

Ninety (90%) of a child's brain develops by the age of 5, before they enter school. From birth, children who have regular doctor and dental check-ups, attend high quality child care, are read to and engaged every day are better prepared for school.

How do I prepare my child?

Children that enter school ready to learn score higher on third grade reading tests, a predictor of high school graduation rates. Community Hubs offer resources for parents, caregivers and families in preparing their child for school.

How does the Community Benefit?

For every dollar spent on early investments in young children, at least \$4-\$9 is saved in juvenile justice, remedial and special education. Prevention and early intervention investments are critical.

School Readiness Checklist

Health: Visit the Doctor Regularly.

Keeping you and your family healthy starts with regular checkups and monitoring physical and emotional development. Your family's well-being is shaped by the healthy food choices, regular exercise, and care you provide. Keep all health appointments and make sure your family is safe at all times.

Early Literacy: Talk, Read and Sing daily.

Readers start by hearing thousands of new words before they go to school. You are the first and most important teacher. Talking about your day, singing songs in the car, and reading stories at bedtime are just a few ways to build stronger brains and form bonds together.

Parenting: Nurture your child.

Your child's behavior is linked to their development. The more connected you are, the better parent you can be. Knowing where they are developmentally will help you understand their behavior and respond in a positive way to guide their learning. You can strengthen your family by building positive relationships. Click the following linking to complete a developmental check-up. ASQ Part 1, ASQ Part 2.

Child Care: Choose high quality child care.

Children who attend high quality child are better prepared for school. A high quality provider will involve you in the program, connect with your child, offer community resources, and support you as your child's first teacher.

Community Hubs: Get connected.

Community Hubs are a place where families are healthy, learning and growing. Hubs offer groups, activities, and classes for families with children ages 0-18 supported by a team of family engagement, literacy and health specialists.

2a. HEALTH PAGE

Why is preventive health important?

Keeping you and your family healthy starts with regular checkups and monitoring physical and emotional development.

You are your child's first and most important teacher.

Your family's well-being is shaped by the healthy food choices, regular exercise, and care you provide. See a doctor regularly during pregnancy, keep all health appointments and make sure your family is safe at all times.

What Can I Do?

Starting at birth, schedule and attend regular well-child visits to find and prevent health problems. Make health a part of your daily routine by exercising, sharing healthy meal times and keeping your family safe. Don't forget about a healthy smile! Help keep teeth and gums healthy by visiting the dentist every six months, beginning at one year old or at the first tooth.

HOW DO I KNOW?

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) has a schedule of well-child care visits available online at www.HealthyChildren.org. By using this schedule, you will know when to take your child to the doctor, what to expect at each visit, questions to ask the doctor, and learn about preventive health.

Who Can I Talk To?

If you have challenges finding insurance, doctors, or guiding your family's health, a Community Health Advocate is available through your Hub to answer questions and work with you to strengthen your family's wellness. Your Hub team also has a Public Health Nurse to provide health assessments, discuss options and connect you with community resources.

- Help you and your family find health insurance.
- Offer connections to doctors and dentists.
- Provide information and resources on health and wellness at the library and other community events.

- Available for client advocacy and home visits.
- Provide nursing assessments, interventions and developmental screening.

2b. EARLY LITERACY PAGE

Why is Early Literacy Important?

Your child needs to hear thousands of new words and sounds before they learn to read.

You are your child's first and most important teacher.

When you talk, read, and sing with your child, you're strengthening your bond and helping them learn. Research shows that talking, reading, and singing with your child every day from birth builds their brain as well as important language, math, reading and social-emotional skills.

What can I do?

You probably naturally talk to your baby about the events of the day. Keep doing it, and do it more! The more words they hear from you, the better prepared they will be to learn. Check out new books at the library, read together before bed each night, sing silly songs in the car, and attend a storytime. Every moment is a learning moment for your child.

How do I know?

You can guide your child's learning and keep track of their progress by using the Reach Out and Read (ROR) Milestones available at the Library or at www.reachoutandread.org. By using the milestone chart, you will understand your child's language development, make sure they are on track, and find activities to promote learning.

Who Can I Talk To?

If you have any questions about early literacy or how to connect with other community resources, talk to the Early Childhood Literacy Specialist at your Hub or call to connect over the phone.

2c. PARENTING PAGE

Why is understanding my child's development important? Your child's behavior is linked to their development. The more you understand about your child's behaviors, the more connected you will be and the better you can express care and love to them.

You are your child's first and most important teacher.

Make time each day to connect, talk and play with your child. Children who feel cared for and loved develop stronger social-emotional skills like confidence and self-esteem, which make it easier for them to manage their emotions so they can do better in school and beyond.

What can I do?

Complete a developmental check-up using the Ages and Stages Questionnaires (ASQ and ASQ:SE) available in the library or on our <u>resources</u> page. Understanding your child's development brings you closer, and helps parents teach their child the social-emotional skills they need to learn and grow. Connect with other families and parenting resources by attending playgroups and parenting workshops offered through your Hub.

How do I know?

Parenting is part natural and part learned. As your child grows, they will reach new milestones and each stage will bring a new way to connect. When parents and caregivers learn to recognize the feelings behind their children's behaviors, parenting is easier. Stay in tune to your child's feelings as they grow and complete regular developmental check-ups.

El Dorado Community Hubs: Where families are healthy, caring, learning & growing.

Community Hubs offer classes, groups, and activities for expectant parents and families with children ages 0-18, staffed by a team of family engagement, literacy and health specialists.

Vision: Healthy and strong communities throughout El Dorado County.

Mission: Build resiliency with families through collaborative, community-based prevention and early intervention services.

Community Hubs are a partnership between First 5 El Dorado, EDC Library, EDC Early Care and Education Planning Council, EDC Child Abuse Prevention Council, EDC Health and Human Services Agency's Maternal Child and Adolescent Health Program and Mental Health Services Act.

Health

Keeping your family safe and healthy can have its challenges. Strengthen your family's health by connecting with staff and participating in Hub activities. Get health tips, find insurance, doctors, dentists, and activities that promote wellness. Health staff at your Hub are available by appointment to meet with you, provide individual assessment, and assistance.

Literacy

You are your child's first and most important teacher. Hubs offer a learning center of resources and tools to help your child build strong language skills. Meet other families at story times, check out new books, story time kits, play centers and workshops to support talking, reading and singing with your child daily. Visit a Hub and connect with one of the Early Childhood Literacy Specialists to learn more.

Parenting

Children's behavior is linked to their development. Hubs provide activities to better understand and support your child's development. Help your child with making friends and sharing feelings through a Play & Learn, check out an ASQ kit, complete a developmental questionnaire, and find parenting resources to help you manage changing behaviors. Family Engagement Specialists are available by appointment to meet with you at your Hub.

4. IMPACT PAGE

The Commission indicators most important to a child's readiness for kindergarten entry include:

- Regular preventive health and dental care
- Access to high quality child care and education
- Daily reading routines
- Parental understanding of child development

Health:

Nearly all (97%) of parents reported their child had a well child exam in the past 12 months, prior to kindergarten enrollment.

Child Care:

Last year, 53% of all participating licensed providers were Tier 3 or above on the quality rating matrix, indicating that quality is in place.

Literacy:

Over half of the families (78%) reported they or another family member read stories or looked at picture books with their child every day.

Child Development:

There were moderate improvements within the protective factors associated with nurturing and attachment (7%), social emotional supports (11%) and knowledge of parenting and child development

4a. INVESTMENTS PAGE

Early Investments have a long term impact.

First 5 El Dorado works closely with county agencies and community based partners, leveraging local resources to increase the value of its investments.

The Commission has identified strategies based on research and best practice models to support services that make a difference in the lives of young children.

In 2016-17 the Commission adopted a new strategic plan focusing on a "Community Hub" service delivery model. Community Hubs are seen as a tool to facilitate early childhood community services that align with the Strengthening Families Framework and Five Protective Factors.

4b. HEALTH

Timely well child care is an important component of school readiness, helping to protect children against major illnesses through vaccination, providing families with information about growth and development, connecting the children and families to a doctor that can provide care when the child is sick, and sharing strategies for health promotion.

Well child care can also help to identify health problems that may impact learning — such as problems with vision or hearing.

The evaluation revealed that the majority of the children in families surveyed are receiving preventive health care.

First 5 invested in preventative care through the Children's Health program. A total of 182 children birth through 5 and 153 caregivers were served through this work in 2016-17.

Among surveys of families participating in First 5 services, 96% reported their child had a well child exam within the past 12 months. Among Pre-K Observation Forms, this rate was 92%.

4c. CHILD CARE

High quality early care and education helps children to develop the skills they need for kindergarten and later school success. Considerable research over the last several decades has demonstrated long term gains for children that participate in high quality early care and education, especially children from disadvantaged households.

First 5 El Dorado and its partners are working to ensure that the quality of early care and education is in place through its investments in High 5 for Quality and participation with the Race to the Top Early Learning Challenge.

High 5 for Quality (H5Q) effectively engaged participants to increase the quality of early care and education programs across El Dorado County.

In FY 16-17, the H5Q program served a total of 80 licensed early care and education programs. 40 of those programs are center-based sites and represent 63% of all early care and education centers in the county (40 of 63).

The majority of participating programs ranked Tier 4 (35% or 28), while 53% (42 of 80) ranked Tier 3 or higher.

4d. LITERACY

Reading aloud with children helps children to develop language and literacy skills, and has been described as the single most important activity for success in reading.

Reading proficiently by third grade has been determined as a critical benchmark for long term success in school.

First 5 El Dorado invests in early literacy through its Ready to Read at your library program.

The percentage of First 5 participating families reading to their children on a daily basis increased from 65% in FY 15-16 to 78% in FY 16-17.

In 2016-17 the Library engaged 2,759 children birth to 5 and 1,967 parents and caregivers in literacy activities.

The majority of families surveyed indicated that they read to their children at least 5 days a week (271 or 89%). Of that total, 238 (or 78% overall) indicated reading to their children every day.

4e. CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Developmental screenings help families and providers to determine if a child is developing on track, and, if there are concerns, developmental screenings point to activities and interventions. Children that have delays in one or more areas of development can often make considerable gains when issues are identified and when interventions start early. Developmental screening can also help families with typically developing children to understand and support optimal growth.

First 5 El Dorado supports developmental screenings through Together We Grow.

In 2016, 632 children and 566 adults were served through this program receiving information and assistance with developmental screenings.

In FY 16-17, a total of 513 children were provided with developmental screenings and 20 received a referral for early intervention or community services.

ABOUT PAGE

Children and Families Commission:

First 5 El Dorado receives approximately \$1 million annually through revenues generated by Proposition 10 passed by California voters in 1998. These funds are used to enhance or fund new programs, services and infrastructure supportive of young children and families. The aim is to invest effectively in a network of prevention and early intervention services for families with young children.

Vision

All children will live in nurturing families and enter school ready to learn.

Mission

First 5 El Dorado Children and Families Commission is committed to strengthening children birth through 5 and their families by promoting and enhancing comprehensive early childhood systems.

- A strategic, systematic approach is taken in developing recommendations

 Staff and contractors will continue to research opportunities to leverage additional funding.

An Evaluation Plan guides outcomes using a results based accountability framework, consistent with ordinance:

Family Functioning

- Parents of children are confident in caring for their child.
- Parents of children birth through 5 understand their child's development.
- Children birth through 5 are read to on a daily basis.

Child Development

- Children birth through 5 are cared for in high quality environments.
- Parents of children birth through 5 know how to choose high quality ECE services.
- ECE providers caring for children birth through 5 know how to provide high quality ECE services.

Child Health

- Children birth through 5 have timely well child visits.
- Children birth through 5 have semi-annual dental visits.

System of Care

- Children enter school physically and emotionally healthy, ready to learn.
- Community Hubs report increased knowledge of parenting and child development, an understanding of early childhood community resources and understand the referral process.
